1. REMINDER-REPEAT NOTICE.

The DKC Board of Directors has approved the requirement that DKC members must attend at least one (1) regular membership meeting and perform at least two (2) services in order to qualify for half-price training classes. This requirement must be met during the twelve month period immediately preceding the starting date of the class in question. This policy will take effect January 1, 1987.

FOR YOUR INFORMATION:

The Gazette reports that some plants, trees and shrubs that may be harmless during the spring and summer months can turn toxic in the fall. This is according to veterinarians at the University of Pennsylvania. Rhododendron, azalea, nightshade, acorns, mountain laurel and yew needles all are poisonous. Red maple leaves are especially poisonous to horses, but may also affect dogs who might swallow some while playing in piles of leaves. A single leaf of oleander may be fatal to a dog or cat.

The leaves, twigs and bark of apple trees and left over apple cider create cyanide when rotting. Symptoms include convulsions, uncoordinated movements and excitement followed by depression. In order to properly treat a poisoned animal, it is important to know what caused the symptoms. All suspected cases of poisoning should be treated as emergencies.

Peak toothpast (a Colgate-Palmolive product) is good for brushing your dog's teeth, as it has a nondetergent, baking soda formula.

Foot bandages can be kept dry by spraying the outer wrap with a product similar to Scotchgard.

It may be possible to obtain discarded or outdated infant incubators and other useful equipment from local hospitals that might be of use to breeders with newborn puppies.

Are Pet Owners A Special Breed??

A clinical psychologist at the University of Mississippi Medical Center compared personality characteristics of 124 pet owners with those of 50 non-pet owners and found that people with pets are generally more outgoing than people who do not enjoy animal companionship, and that pet owners also displayed a higher degree of leadership. The study also seemed to confirm the idea that people do indeed, take after their pets. It was found that cat owners displayed traits generally associated with cats, such as inquisitiveness and dog owners ranked high in one of the qualities we admire in our dogs-friendliness.
