This is an important contribution to the success of our show and Ann is grateful to all who were able to help.
- 3. Don't forget the box in the entry area for donations to the animal shelter. A special request has been made for stuffed animals to comfort orphaned or young puppies and kittens. If you have small children who have stuffed toys that they no longer need or want don't throw them out—bring them to the kennel club for the animal shelter...and let's admit it, some of us so—called adults (in addition to liking kid's cereals) refuse to give up our stuffed animals too, but do we really need an entire bed full????

If any DKC members belong to breed clubs that use the Plantation Inn in Raleigh as the location for their specialty shows, be advised that the future of that facility for dog shows is in serious jeopardy. The folks at the Plantation Inn have become disenchanted with the obvious lack of concern shown for their property by recent dog show participants. If you belong to a breed club that hopes to use that motel in the future—a word to the wise should be sufficient. What a shame to lose that outstanding location for the rest of us because of the carelessness of a few!

For those of our members who have expressed curiosity about the origin of several of our year end trophies, the following is offered for your information.

The Haines Show Dog Trophy was donated by the late Vivian and Howard Haines who were active DKC members for many years. Their special breed interest was long-coated Dachshunds. Both Vivian and Howard were very encouraging in our club's efforts to begin construction of our present clubhouse and Howard, who was an architect, actually drew up the original plans for the building. Unfortunately, before the building was completed the Haines retired to Texas so they were never able to enjoy the building as our members presently do.

The Fowler Show Bitch Trophy was donated by the late Herman Fowler, a staunch DKC supporter and devotee of the Pug breed. Herman died of cancer a number of years ago, but was able to attend the DKC picnic where, with great celebration, the mortgage on our building was burned. There is a snaphot on the bulletin board of this event and Herman is pictured there enjoying that special moment in our club's history. Herman got his start in Pugs from Romola Hicks, another late DKC member who gained recognition with her Gayberry Pugs kennel name.

The Kartye Stud Dog and Brood Bitch Trophies were both donated by Peter Kartye who enjoyed considerable success with his Borzoi and long-coated Dachshunds. Peter served as president of our club and also gained much recognition following the publication of his book on the history and bloodlines of Dachshunds, entitled "Roots". Shortly after we moved into our present building Peter moved to San Francisco where he died several years later.

The Hill Breeders Trophy was donated by the late Frances Hill who did a great deal of breeding and showing of Pointers, with considerable success. She was a long time member and supporter of the DKC and it's activities.

The Thompson Obedience Trophy was donated by B. J. Thompson who was a very active DKC member for many years. B. J. bred, showed in conformation and obedience and did field work with her Labrador Retrievers under the Signal Hill kennel name. B. J. was very active in obedience and was one of the driving forces in getting our obedience program at the DKC underway. B. J. has retired and now lives in Florida, but at last report still has a Lab or two sleeping on her bed.

The Grimson Tracking Trophy was donated by Dr. Keith Grimson and his wife Mozelle who were Labrador Retriever enthusiasts and very active DKC members for many years. They were especially helpful and encouraging to newcomers to our sport and in fact, B. J. Thompson got her start in Labradors from the Grimsons. The Grimsons were also very much involved with the construction of our building.

The Holland Versatility Trophy was donated by Hank Holland, following the death of his wife, Mary, and in her memory. Hank and Mary were active members of our club and involved with almost all of our activities. Mary served as club treasurer for many years and helped with anything that needed to be done. Mary and Hank enjoyed success with their Belgian Tervuren, but due to Mary's health problems, they were limited in what they could do with their dogs personally. Two miniature Poodles also shared their home. Hank and Mary were both interested in encouraging club members to participate in varied activities with their dogs, thus the versatility award came to be.

Continuing with the history lesson----in re-reading the above, it is quite evident that the building of our present clubhouse was a great event in the history of our club. It was a monumental project for a group of dog people to undertake and many of our present club members still recall the pride and excitement that was felt when the ground breaking

took place and our building became a reality.

Many of our more recent members may not be aware that the old cement block building directly opposite our driveway on Guess Road used to be the DKC Clubhouse. Our classes were held there, as were our monthly meetings and our rental fee was \$100.00 a month. The only heat was a large fireplace, which provided plenty of atmosphere, but not much heat unless you were right in front of it. The first person to arrive on cold nights got the job of getting the fire started and from then on keeping it going was everyone's job. There was room for two small rings for classes with a lot of fancy jockeying for position in front of the fireplace and extra slow heeling when that one warm spot was being passed during the heeling exercise. Anti-freeze had to be added to the toilets to keep them from freezing——sometimes it worked and sometimes it didn't. Air-conditioning, of course, was non-existent. That location did tend to separate the serious dog people from the not so serious and certainly a lively sense of humor was a bonus.

The above is mentioned only to give you some insight into why "the building of our present clubhouse was a great event in the history of our club."

'End of history lesson—at least for now. If you haven't done so, consider reading the DKC Archives (a copy is in our library). Our club has been in operation for well over 50 years and its history is quite interesting and something that we should all be very proud of.
