German Shepherd Dog — Dog of the Month

The German Shepherd dog is a strong, agile, well-muscled animal, alert and full of life.

It is well balanced, longer than tall, deep-bodied, and presents an outline of smooth curves rather than angles.

The dog has a strong, muscular, clean-cut and rather muscular neck. The V-shaped muzzle is long and strong; the ears are moderately pointed and in proportion to the skull. The tail is bushy and at rest hangs in a slight curve. The ideal dog has a double coat of medium length. The outer coat should be as dense as possible, hair straight, harsh and lying close to the body. A slightly wavy outer coat, often of wiry texture is permissible. The coat varies in color; strong rich colors are preferred. Pale washed-out colors and blues or livers are serious faults. At the present time white is disqualified.

Background

He was developed in Germany as a sheepherder, but he is now the world's leading guard, police, military, and Schutzhund dog. He is used for avalanche and earthquake search and rescue, narcotics and bomb detection, tracking missing persons,

and guiding the blind. He is also a home guardian and companion.

Temperament

He is discriminating, confident, steady, very responsive to firm and fair obedience training, and willing and able to learn and do anything. Reserved and protective, he should be accustomed to people and other dogs at an early age. A dominant dog may refuse commands from family members who have not established leadership over him. This intelligent dog must be owned and handled by someone who is as smart and capable as he is.

News from Terri Hardwick

Terri has been teaching herding classes for the past five years.

On the morning of Christmas Eve, 2 large black dogs jumped her fence and savagely attacked her sheep. All 19 sheep were severely injured. Five had to be put down that day and one died a week and a half later.

The injured sheep would surely have died without the help and care of the DKC members who donated massive amounts of time for wound flushing and other much needed attention.

The male dog was shot at the scene as he attacked a neighbor who heard the commotion and came to help; the female was taken back to the owner. She returned one week later to attack another neighbor's goats, killing two of them.

Criminal as well as civil charges are being proffered.

Possible Dog Regulations

According to Stan Brag, director of the county's animal control division, in a news release to The Herald-Sun [1/12/98], the county is considering several proposed changes to Durham's animal control ordinance:

- Doubling penalties for dogs running loose.
- Clarifying requirements for owners of dangerous dogs.
- Changes would ban the use of metal "choke chains" as leashes
- The transportation of unrestrained dogs in the back of trucks or open areas of any vehicle would be outlawed.

Increasing the civil fine for failing to vaccinate pets for rabies would increase from \$25 to \$100.

This information was released as if the Animal Control Advisory Commission, which is the liaison group between Mr. Bragg and the Commissioners, had approved of the changes. Maureen Lucas, a member of our club and a member Animal Control Advisory Commission was unaware of the Commission as having given approval.

Irresponsible dog owners must be dealt with, but it is important for us, as responsible dog owners, to be aware of legislation which could have a great impact on our lives and that of our dogs. There are meetings of the commissioners, open to the public, which are held once a month. You can find out what is happening by attending these meetings, calling your commissioner, or calling Maureen Lucas at 919-477-9432.

Registration of Imported Dogs

A DNA profile from an AKC approved laboratory will be accepted as an alternative to a microchip or tattoo identification to meet requirements for AKC registration for an imported dog.

Amendments to the Obedience Regulations

Several amendments to the Obedience Regulations were passed. The Amendments will be published in the January Secretary's page and will be effective as of February 1, 1998:

- To expand the definition of what collars are acceptable to be worn in the ring.
- To modify the eligibility requirements for the Novice A and Open A classes.

- To allow a Novice A or Open A exhibitor to enter more than one dog in their class.
- To provide an exhibitor with the opportunity to warm-up his or her dog to include any exercise performed in the Obedience ring.
- ➤ To lower the jump height to once the height of the dog at the withers for all breeds, with the exception of the massive breed, who will jump 3/4's the height at their withers.

Amendments to the Tracking Regulations

Several amendments to the Tracking Regulations were passed. The Amendments will be published in the January Secretary's page and will be effective as of February 1, 1998. They cover:

- > The allowable distances between the tracks.
- The use of building and the resultant diverse scenting conditions in variable surface tracking.
- Sites totally or partially covered in snow and how they might not meet the criteria of three different surfaces.
