Norwich Terrier:

Dog of the Month

The Norwich Terriers are hardy, happygo-lucky



weatherproof companions. Their body lengths and breadths vary, but their docked tails should be long enough to grasp. Smooth coated and wedge shaped, their heads should have plenty of brain room with ears spaced well apart. Small dark almond eyes, together with a foxy muzzle, give the Norwich a typically impish expression. Today they weigh about 12 pounds, are short legged, sturdy and can be any shade from wheaten to dark red, black and tan or grizzled.

Background

The Norwich Terrier was developed into a hunt terrier, riding in the saddlebag as the huntsmen who were on horseback followed the foxhounds. The little terrier was then dropped to the ground when the fox went to ground; it was his job to bolt the fox from his den.

This terrier was bred in Cambridge, Market Harborough, and Norwich, England. He was first recognized in England in 1932. In 1964, the Norwich was classified as a separate breed differentiating it from the Norfolk; this classification was accepted in the U.S. by the AKC on January 1, 1979.

Temperament

They are usually friendly with strangers and less scrappy than many terriers with other dogs. The Norwich should not be let off the leash unless they are in a safely fenced area because they are independent chasers. Although slow to mature, the Norwich responds fairly well to firm, fair obedience training. They are loyal and alert and have a sensitive intelligence, but can be hard to housebreak and are tireless diggers and barkers.

The Norwich adapts easily to any home if allowed some outdoor exercise. They are very sociable, very busy and demand full participation in all activities.

The Norwich Terrier was chosen Best-In-Show this year at the Westminster Show. [see page 5]



AKC Delegate's Report

First of all, my apologies for submitting such a late report on the December meeting -- I missed the December deadline for our newsletter due to the Christmas rush, and when I e-mailed the report to Terri for the January newsletter, it evidently went out somewhere in cyberspace, but not to her! But better late than never, and now I can include some information on the upcoming March meeting as well.

Because of travel arrangements in December I was unable to attend any of the committee meetings that are held the Monday before the actual Delegate's meetings, so I can't report on them this time. However, I will be able to attend these meetings in March, so if any DKC member has any special interests in the work done by these committees (Dog Show Rules, Canine Health, Parent Clubs, All Breed Clubs, etc.), please let me know and I will sit in on that meeting for you and let you know what the topics of discussion were.

The December Delegate's Meeting was held on Tuesday the 9th at the Grand Hyatt Hotel. The day began with the Delegate's Forum and we were treated to a fascinating report the Parent Club Genetics Conference that was held in St. Louis in November. The highlight of the Forum was a talk given by Dr. Elaine Ostrander of the University of Washington on the Development and Application of the Canine Genome. Partially as a result of these AKC sponsored conferences, there is a great deal of collaboration between Dr. Ostander's lab and those of other researchers. These collaborations have resulted in great strides being in mapping made the canine genome, and this research has the potential to be of enormous benefit to the purebred dog fancy. Tests to identify carriers of several sorts of genetic disease have already been developed (e.g., a form of PRA in Irish Setters, copper toxicosis in Bedlington Terriers), and there are many more tests which should be available to breeders in the next few years. Anyone interested in reading about the research presented at the Genetics Conference in more detail can check out the December, 1997 issue of the journal Genomics, or the upcoming issue of the journal Canine Practice, as Dr. Ostrander indicated that conference proceedings will be published there.

At the actual Delegates meeting in the afternoon, two new clubs (the Buckeye Retriever Club and the Sussex Spaniel Club of America) were elected as AKC member clubs. The next order of business was to have been a vote on two proposed amendments to the AKC Constitution and Bylaws that would have ensured geographic representation on the Nominating Committees and would have prevented Delegates from signing petitions for more candidates than they have votes. However, these proposed amendments were withdrawn by the Delegate who made them, Dick Perrell of the Scottsdale Dog Fanciers Association. Next was a vote on a proposed amendment that would eliminate the requirement that all minor "housekeeping" Rule and Bylaw amendments be read at a Delegates meeting. The thinking behind this amendment was that currently there is no way around reading every single amendment to the Constitution and Bylaws, whether it is major or minor, and this is a logistics nightmare. For example, there is a proposal afoot to simplify Bylaws by changing all "show references to committee. bench committee. field trial committee", etc., to "event committee". This would result in 209 changes and every single section would have to be read aloud at the Delegates meeting! After much discussion pro and con, a vote was taken and your Delegate voted in favor of the proposal, for it made a

good deal of sense to me. However, although a majority of the Delegates were in favor of the proposal, two-thirds of the vote is required for an amendment to pass and this goal was not reached so the amendment was defeated.

Six amendments were read which will be voted on at the March meeting. The first of these, if passed, would prohibition eliminate the advertising an event prior to AKC approval. AKC already advertises corresponding and pending dates in the Events Calendar, so it doesn't make sense to keep this rule on the The second amendment books. would stipulate exactly which AKC publications must be available at an event (e.g. Rules Applying to Dog Shows, Dealing With Misconduct, etc.). The third amendment would the requirement eliminate obtaining a postal certification when event premium lists are mailed -these postal certifications are difficult to obtain and AKC doesn't check them anyway. The fourth amendment would permit alcoholic beverages to be given as prizes at events. Evidently the rule prohibiting this was put on the books during Prohibition and was never repealed! Many clubs have asked that they be allowed to include a bottle of wine in a gift basket, and this amendment must be changed before they can do The fifth amendment would permit specialty clubs to offer multiple-win trophies for first place in non-regular classes (i.e., Veterans, Stud Dog, etc.) -- currently such trophies may only be offered in the regular classes. The sixth amendment would permit the transfer of a dog between the Puppy and Twelve-to-Eighteen-Month class just as transfers are now permitted between the two divisions of the Puppy Class. The thinking here is that age miscalculations are as common between Puppy and 12-to-18 as they are between 6-to-9 and 9to-12 classes, and should be handled the same way.

In other news, it was announced that there are plans to change the litter registration procedure so that all coowners of a dam must sign the form, which the Board hopes will help prevent disputes between co-owners, or at least force them to settle their differences before litter registrations are applied for. Marg Pough, the Delegate for the Finger Lakes KC. reported that her lab at Cornell is seeing two new types Leptospirosis in dogs (leptospirosis pomona & I leptospirosis grippo typhosa) and recommended that anyone testing their dogs for lepto ask that these types be included in the laboratory work up. She also reported that ehrlichosis in dogs is on the rise, and is important to test for several different varieties rather than just for ehrlichia canis, as several different types of ehrlichia have been reported in dogs. The December Delegates meeting was adjourned following these reports.

The March Delegates meeting will be held on Tuesday the 10th at the Sheraton New York Hotel. The agenda includes votes on the amendments that were read at the December meeting (see above) and Board Elections. The candidates for the AKC Board include Robert L. Kelly, Kenneth A. Marden, Asa Mays, John Ronald, Bernard Schwartz, Robert D. Smith, and John A. Studebaker. If anyone has opinions on the proposed amendments or on candidates for the AKC Board of Directors, please contact me before March 7th. Remember, I am <u>your</u> representative, and the more input I get from you, the better I can do my iob!
