Greyhound: Dog of the Month

Swift as a ray of light, graceful as a swallow, and wise as Solomon, there is some basis for the prediction that the Greyhound is a breed which will never die. His coat is

short, smooth and firm in texture and the color is not judged by the AKC. The shape of the head is long and narrow, fairly wide between the ears with a scarcely noticeable stop; the ears are small and fine in texture, thrown back and folded, except when excited, when they are semipricked; the eyes are dark, bright, intelligent and spirited. He is sensitive to medications and heat and cold.

Background

Well-known in ancient Greece and Egypt as an excellent sight hound, the greyhound was once called the *gaze hound*. A dog bearing striking resemblance to the greyhound in England in the eighth century is on record. The greyhound was brought to the Atlantic coast of Europe by the Spanish around 1500.

Once used in all types of hunting, this breed became popular as a race dog with the reputation of being the fastest dog in the world. Because it is so popular as a race dog, it has the distinction of being the only breed whose rescue population is larger than its AKC registration. There are 40 to 50 thousand per year requiring rescue of which only 5 to 10% are rescued. In our area The Triangle Greyhound Society (919-743-6263) handles rescue.

Temperament

The Greyhound is quiet, clean, trustworthy, optimistic, gentle and good with people. In the state of Kansas, where racing Greyhounds began, there is a law which makes the Greyhound the sole dog who is allowed to live in residential facilities (nursing homes, group homes, etc.). Greyhounds in our club are involved in therapy and Lure Coursing. Maureen Lucas, Jan Gibson, Cynthia Swanson and Donna Brown are DKC members who own (or have owned) greyhounds. Some of their dogs will be with us at our next meeting.

New Puppy Shop

Marie Inman and Terri Toohil

went to visit a new pet store in the Butner-Creedmoor area where five very young, small dogs were being sold. Since it was difficult for Marie and I to determine the breed of these pups, we inquired and were told that they were pekes, a pom and a pekea-poo. We were also told that you can order any breed you want because the store uses the services of a very reputable veterinarian in Nebraska who finds just the right breeder, checks out the pups and ships them.

The store is new and according to the write-up in *The Butler-Creedmore News* (3/26/98, p. 2b), it plans to offer rabbits, hamsters, guinea pigs, kittens (AKC Persian and AKC Himalayan) [I did not know that the AKC was now registering cats!!!!] and non-aggressive/ somewhat aggressive fish for sale in the near future.

Our visit was both shocking and sad. The DKC and the AKC advise that puppy purchases be through a recommended breeder.

AKC Recall

The American Kennel Club is recalling its latest edition [the 19th] of *The Complete Dog Book* after owners objected that some of the nation's most popular breeds were listed as not good with children.

Scotties, Dalmatians, Yorkshire terriers, Rottweilers, dachshunds and

35 other breeds were considered to be unsuitable for kids.

The AKC said the book would be reissued.

Older Dogs: Sam Dudley

Sam Dudley, a beagle owned by South Granville Animal Hospital's veterinarian, Dr. Diana Dudley, celebrated his 21st birthday on March 20th. "He would be 120 years old in people years.", said Dr. Dudley.

Sam came to the animal hospital with a broken back after a hunting accident. His previous owners wanted to have Sam put to sleep because he was no longer any good for hunting. Dr. Dudley brought him back to health and kept him for her own. He goes to work with her and even performs social duties; last May, Sam was best man at the wedding of Diana Dudley and Dean Richards, complete with tuxedo and bow tie.

Older Dogs: Need More Protein

Research seems to be indicating that older dogs need more protein than young adult dogs. Excessive protein restriction may induce protein deficiency in older pets, and thus impair wound healing, immune functions, enzyme activities, and cell replacement. Pet Health by Ralston Purina - CNM 4732

A word of caution though--many breeders indicate that not all protein is equal.

"No question the old folk's kidneys have more and more trouble handling protein. But I believe that what the kidneys have to handle is what the body cannot use. The body needs a balance of amino acids to make up a complete protein. Many of these are in short supply in vegetable proteins, and if there is an shortage of one amino acid, then the dog may not properly utilize others, but pass them on as an extra burden to the kidneys. Hence I think that, especially for the older dogs, we need to look more closely at the quality of the protein fed. A relatively small amount of fully

balanced protein (and eggs are one of the best-balanced proteins, if the fat can be tolerated) would be a better bet for an older dog than a food with a higher level of poor quality protein. (This might take a little research and even a little home cooking.)

Older Dogs: Cataracts

A bluish-gray tint to the eyes of a geriatric dog is a normal aging change called *lenticular sclerosis* and is caused by a hardening of the lens. It is not a true cataract and vision is often unaffected and treatment is not required. *Pet Health by Ralston Purina - CNM 4732*

Older Dogs: Exercise

Two common problems experienced by older dogs are obesity and arthritis--both of which can be greatly improved with regular exercise. *Pet Health by Ralston Purina - CNM 4732*

<u>Indoor and Outdoor Plants which are dangerous to dogs and humans</u>: Amaryllis, Arrowhead, Azalea, Bird of paradise, Castor bean, Clivia, Crown of thorns, Cyclamen, Daffodil, Dumbcane, Flowering tobacco, Frangipani, Glory lily, Hyacinth, Holly, Hydrangea, Ivy, Jerusalem cherry, Lily, Lobelia, Milkweed, Peace lily, Philodendron, Pothos, Ranunuculus, Umbrella plant, and Winter cherry.
