Lhasa Apso: Dog of the Month



The **Lhasa Apso**, a member of the Non - Sporting Group, is keen, bold, assertive, lively, playful and

strong-willed. He can be suspicious of strangers and should be accustomed to people at an early age. He is a good warning dog with a gentle and even temperament. He is easily trained by those he trusts and responsive to kindness. He's adaptable and makes an excellent companion.

Background: The Lhasa Apso originated in Tibet where he is called "Bark Lion Sentinel Dog." In village huts, around the sacred city of Lhasa, he barked when strangers approached, notifying the huge Tibetan Mastiffs who would then lumber over to investigate. The Lhasa Apso was first accepted for registration by the AKC in 1935. It was originally shown in the Terrier Group, then reassigned to the Non-Sporting Group in 1959. Approval was given to the Lhasa Apso by the AKC on July 11, 1978.

Show Ring: The length from point of shoulders to point of buttocks is longer than the height at withers, well ribbed up, strong loin, well-developed quarters and thighs. Size is variable, but about 10 inches or 11 inches at the shoulder is acceptable for dogs with bitches slightly smaller. Dogs will weigh between 17 and 20 lbs.; bitches between 15 and 18. The preferred bite is either level or slightly undershot. The muzzle is of medium length; a square muzzle is objectionable. The coat is heavy, straight, hard, not woolly nor silky, of good length, and very dense. All colors are equally acceptable with or without dark tips to ears and beard.

Breeding and Whelping: While the bitch is usually a free whelper, the delivery should be attended. The undershot bite does not permit the bitch to

sever the cord easily. Lhasa Apso puppies average between 5 and 7 ounces at birth. Formerly puppies were born with a kink at the tip of the tail. Today, this trait has almost disappeared.

Growth is steady with the dog reaching his mature weight at 12 to 15 months. Average weight seems to be increasing in the breed and some dogs may reach 25 lbs.

Breed Disqualifications: There are **no breed disqualifications**.

Recognized Problems: The major congenital defects of the breed are umbilical and inguinal hernias, patellar luxations and medial entropion. Renal cortical hypoplasia is a serious cause of uremia in some lines where symptoms begin at about 1 year.

Old Age: Decreasing interest in physical activity often results in weigh gain. Because of the short muzzle, respiratory difficulties are sometimes experienced by the older dog.

CRUFTS POSTPONED

The Crufts 2001 was postponed and did not take place as planned on Mar. 8 – 11 due to the situation with Foot and Mouth disease.

Spring Agility Trials

DKC will again be hosting 3 days of agility trials at the Harris Road property in Rougemont. The dates of these trials are Friday April 20, Sat April 21, and Sun April 22. Judging begins at 8 am all 3 days and will be completed by around 3 or 4 pm. Two rings will run simultaneously - one for the standard classes and one for the jumper classes. There will be concessions available and vendors.

Many club members will be needed to work at these trials. If you are willing and available for any or all of these days, please contact Mary Whorton 919-471-1405 whort002@mc.duke.edu. Email is preferred if possible.

Experience is not necessary. We will especially need help Sunday afternoon.

Agility Height Cards

We will have an AKC measuring judge available all 3 days of our agility trials to officially measure dogs for agility height cards. As of January 2001, all dogs competing in agility must be measured prior to competition. Once they have an official height card they only need to present that card or submit a Xerox copy of it with their entry. Anyone who wishes to have their dog measured and is not entered in the trial may still do so. This height measurement will only be good for agility, not obedience or breed. You must bring the dog's registered name, date of birth, and AKC number. To receive a permanent card the dog must be 2 years of age. If the dog is less than 2 years, he will receive a temporary card which will expire on the dog's 2nd birthday.

Agility Classes

Several agility classes are underway at this time. On Monday night starting March 26, we have an in-

termediate class at 7 followed by a beginner class at 8.

On Thursday nights starting 7 pm on April 12, but skipping April 19, there will be a run through class with a different course set up each week. This class will run until May 31. For anyone interested in applying for these classes, contact Lisa Connelly at Lisa Connelly <Vance003@acpub.duke.edu> Any handler and dog enrolling in a DKC agility class must be preapproved and demonstrate off lead control around other dogs *and* must not show any signs of aggressive behavior in the presence of other dogs.

Singing Dogs

If any of you are ever in the Birmingham area, they have 2 New Guinea Singing Dogs. They are not on display, but live with caretakers and travel two times a day to the zoo to put on a singing show.

New 3 in 1 Test
