Mastiff : Dog of the Month



The **Mastiff** is a member of the Working Group and was first recognized by the AKC in 1885. He is a gentle friend to man by nature, as man's workbodes

always serving as man's watchdog and loyal companion. This is a dog who likes being around people. He needs their company and bonds close with his family, but may be aggressive with other dogs. Mastiffs are extremely sensitive, devoted and eager to please. Because of his size, he needs room to move, but is content to sit in the house all day if the family is there.

Background: Mastiff refers to a group of large, square-muzzled dogs that have been used for fighting, hunting and guarding since the days of the Roman Empire. In England during the Middle Ages, it was required that one Mastiff be kept for every two peasants, so the breed developed as a family dog. The **Mastiff** was approved by the AKC on November 12, 1991 which became effective December 31, 1991.

Show Ring: Dogs must be a minimum of 30 in. at the shoulder and bitches a minimum of 27¹/₂ in. at the shoulder. The proportion is rectangular; the length of the dog from forechest to rump is somewhat longer than the height at the withers. The height of the dog should come from depth of body rather than from length of leg.

The outer coat is straight, coarse, and of moderately short length. The undercoat is dense, short, and close lying. It should not be so long as to produce "fringe" on the belly, tail, or hind legs. Coat colors are fawn, apricot, or brindle while the muzzle, ears, and nose must be dark in color, the blacker the better. A scissors bite is preferred, but a moderately undershot jaw should not be faulted providing the teeth are not visible when the mouth is closed.

Breeding and Whelping: Mastiffs mature slowly and should not be used

for breeding until they are 2 years old. Bitches usually come into first estrus at 11 to 12 months. Ovulation is irregular (7th to 21st day) and gestation ranges from 60 to 67 days. Five puppies are an average litter, although litters of up to 14 have been reported. Many bitches experience *uterine inertia* after whelping 1 or 2 puppies. Supervised exercise is essential for proper muscle tone. At birth the pups weigh from 1 to 1.5 pounds.

Breed Disqualifications: None.

Faults: Dogs or bitches below the minimum standard, lack of substance or slab sided, straight stifles, long or wavy coat, excessive white on the chest or white on any other part of the body, mask, ears, or nose lacking dark pigment, snipiness of the muzzle.

Recognized Problems: Obesity, elbow dysplasia, ectropion and persistent pupillary membranes, vaginal hyperplasia, and bloat are some reported problems.

Old Age: Arthritis, nephritis and heart problems are the ailments that commonly affect aging Mastiffs. The average lifespan is 9 to 10 years.

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Poison Control

Kansas State University's **poison control hot line (for dogs and cats)** can be reached at **785-532-5679**. There is no charge for the call - except for your long distance bill - it's not a toll-free number. The hotline has a direct line to a vet 24 hours a day.

Tips to keep in mind:

1. Always remember it is a race against the clock and the overall goal is to stop the poison from being absorbed into the animal's system.

2. Identify what the chemical is and how much of it the animal has been exposed to.

3. Have the original container handy and as soon as possible call your veterinarian, the local poison control center, or K-State's poison control hot line at 785-532-5679.

4. Always have syrup of ipecac and/or hydrogen peroxide on hand, but DO NOT administer it without instructions from your veterinarian or the poison control center.

5. Wait until the veterinarian or the poison control center has given you instructions before taking any medical action. --Sharon Pitz

Rescue Dogs

One story that was heard concerning the rescue dogs at Ground Zero. The dogs are so well trained that they would work until they died, so there are veterinarians on site. One quarter of the dogs are taken off duty at a time, cleaned up from the soot, treated for their many cuts and given IV's to rehydrate them. Apparently, the dogs could not drink enough, fast enough to keep them going and IV's can replace the fluids faster. These are tough dogs!
