Komondor: Dog of the Month



The Komondor plural Komondorok), a member of the Working Group was first recognized by the AKC in 1937. It

is a serious, conservative guard dog. This breed responds well to obedience training which is strongly recommended. The mature, experienced dog tends to stay close to his charges, whether a flock or family; he is unlikely to be drawn away from them in chase, and typically doesn't wander far. Though very sensitive to the desires of his master, heavy-handed training will produce a stubborn, unhappy **Komondor**. While reserved with strangers, he is demonstrative with those he loves.

Background: The Komondor is the largest Hungarian livestock guard dog. The breed was used to guard the flocks while the smaller Puli did the herding. The mature coat falls into heavy protective cords which are practically impervious to predators and harsh weather. The Komondor was approved by the AKC on June 13, 1994 (Effective: July 31, 1994).

Show Ring: Dogs are 27½ inches and up at the withers; bitches 25½ inches and up at the withers. Dogs are approximately 100 pounds and up, bitches, approximately 80 pounds and up at maturity, with plenty of bone and substance. The body is slightly longer than the height at the withers. Height below the minimum is a fault.

Breeding and Whelping: The whelps weigh from 12 to 18 oz. with an average litter of 7 or more puppies. Newborn coats are pure white and curly; pigmentation is pink. Milk comes in late and many pups are lost during the first week. It is advisable to be prepared with formula, bottles, feeding tubes and instructions. Puppies are very sensitive to temperature changes. It is important that they be watched carefully.

Rate of growth is highly variable. Pigmentation on paw pads and nose is usually complete in a few weeks. A puppy's eyes should be brown by 5 weeks. The corded coat should be obvious at one year and clearly corded by two years. At five, the coat can reach the ground. Some Komondorok are picky eaters and have difficulty gaining weight.

Underbites and misaligned teeth in the lower jaw are common and the underbites become worse with maturity. Bites that are even at 5 months tend to become underbites later.

Breed Disqualifications: Blue eyes, flesh-colored nose, three or more missing teeth, failure of the coat to cord by two years of age, short, smooth coat on both head and legs, color other than white, with the exception of small amounts of cream or buff in puppies.

Faults: Height below the minimum.

Recognized Problems: Skin problems are common. This breed has more cysts that other breeds, but there is usually no difficulty with the removal.

Old Age: The average life span is 10 to 12 years.

Spring Agility Trials

DKC will be hosting 2 all breed agility trials on April 20 and 21 at the property in Rougemont off Harris Rd. Judging usually begins at 8 am, rain or shine and continues until about 4 There each dav. approximately 300 runs each day. Our judge this time is Ms. Edie Allyn from Virginia. Help is needed for many aspects of these trials. In general we need about 50 volunteers each day to cover all the jobs. Experience is wonderful but not necessary. We particularly need helpers for the first two classes each day and the last two classes on Sunday. We need people to time each of the runs, build courses, set bars, straighten chutes, run leashes, post scores, tabulate scores, gate steward, but no figure 8 posts.

We also need folks to help load everything up at the end of the day on Sunday *and* follow the trailer to DKC and unload for agility class the next evening. If you are willing to work, please either e-mail Mary Whorton at whort002@mc.duke.edu or call her at 919-471-1405. E-mail is preferred so she has a written copy of your request. Let her know what hours you will be available and what jobs you might be willing to do. We really love folks who say, "I can be there all day, both days, and I will do whatever you need." But we also understand not everybody can do this.

This a great way for new members to get in required service hours. Even if you don't want to work, but wish to come watch, we'll let you. There is no charge for admission and there will be concessions available along with many vendors. In addition, we will have an official measuring judge there both days to measure dogs for their official AKC height cards. Dogs do not need to be entered but must be at least 12 months old and AKC reaistered. Permanent cards will only be issued for dogs 24 months and older. All others will receive a temporary card which expires when the dog turns 2. This height card is only valid for AKC agility competitions.

New Bloat Findings

Dietary Risk Factors for Gastric Dilatation-Volvulus (Bloat) in 11 Large and Giant Dog Breeds: A Nested Case-Control Study. Malathi Raghavan, DVM, MS; Lawrence T. Glickman, VMD, DrPH; Nita W. Glickman, MS, MPH; Diana B. Schellenberg*, MS. Epidemiology, Copyright 2000 Perdue University

ABSTRACT: Dietary risk factors for gastric dilatation-volvulus (GDV) in dogs were identified using a nested case-control study. Of 1991 dogs from 11 large- and giant-breeds in a previous prospective study of GDV, 106 dogs that developed GDV were selected as cases while 212 remaining dogs were randomly selected as controls. A complete profile of nutrient intake was constructed for each dog based on owner-reported information, published references and nutrient databases. Potential risk factors were examined for a significant (p<0.05) relationship with GDV risk using unconditional logistic regression.

The study confirmed previous reports of an increased risk of associated with increasing age, having a first-degree relative with GDV, and having a raised food bowl. New significant findings included a 2.6-fold (or 160%) increased risk of GDV in dogs that consumed dry foods containing fat among the first four ingredients. The risk of GDV significantly increased 3-fold (or 200%) in dogs that consumed dry foods containing citric acid as a preservative. Dry foods containing a rendered meat meal with bone first product among the four ingredients significantly decreased GDV risk by 53.0%. Moistening of dry food alone was not associated with GDV risk, but consumption of owner-moistened dry foods that also contained citric acid significantly increased GDV risk 4-fold (or 300%). Approximately 30 and 33% of all cases of GDV in this study could be attributed to consumption of dry foods containing fat among their first four ingredients or citric acid, respectively. These findings can be used by owners to select dry foods that may reduce the risk of GDV.
