## English Foxhound

Group II: Hound Breeds



The appearance of the English Foxhound is far stouter than his American cousin. The

tendency today is to breed

hounds that are slightly larger than in the past. They are active dogs with stable temperaments.

Background: There are records showing that the first English Foxhounds were imported from England in 1738. In England, as in America, these hounds have always been used for foxhunting. The majority of the packs today, though, are in England.

Approved: 1935.

Show Ring: Ears: Most English hounds are "rounded" which means that about 11/2 inches is taken off the end of the ear. Bite: The teeth must meet squarely. Coat: Short, dense, hard, and glossy. Color: Not regarded as very important, as long as it is a good "hound color" -- black, tan, and white, or any combination of these three. The symmetry of the Foxhound is of the greatest importance, and what is known as "quality" is highly regarded by all good judges. Legs & Feet: Every Master of Foxhounds insists on legs as straight as a post, and as strong; size of bone at the ankle being especially regarded as all important. The desire for straightness had a tendency to produce knuckling-over, which at one time countenanced, but in recent years this defect has been eradicated by careful breeding and intelligent adjudication, and one sees very little of this trouble in the best modern Foxhounds. The bone cannot be too

large, and the feet in all cases should be round and catlike, with well-developed knuckles and strong horn, which last is of the greatest importance. Chest & Back Ribs--The chest should girth over 31 inches in a 24-inch hound, and the back ribs must be very deep.

Breeding and Whelping: There are practically no whelping problems with this breed. The pups weigh about a pound at birth.

**Disqualifications:** Either pig-mouth (overshot) or undershot.

Recognized Problems: Researchers have not differentiated between the American and English Foxhound. These dogs have a strong physical body and are not susceptible to very many diseases. There can though be bleeding conditions that are inherited as an autosomal dominant or incomplete dominant trait.

Old Age: The average age of the English Foxhound is 13 years.

Delegate: The meeting was held the first week in December. The All Breed Committee continued its discussion of the Veterinary Outreach Program encouraging all-breed clubs to include veterinary students in their programs, shows, etc. to help them understand what breeders and the fancy are about. The importance was stressed in getting them involved and perhaps inviting a student to a breeding and/or to a whelping.

Robin Stansell, Director of Event Operations, presented proposals submitted to the Board of Directors concerning Chapter 2, Sections 3 and 5 of Rules applying to Dog Shows as it applied to club territories. A club not holding a show in its territory for two consecutive years would lose its sole privilege to that territory, allowing another member or non-member club access to show sites. A club may be reinstated in its territory by holding a show. If no licensed or member club holds a

show for four consecutive years, its territory may be reassigned.

A proposal is being submitted to increase the number of activities a member club, including specialty clubs, must complete during a calendar year to be able to hold future dog shows. The AKC is encouraging clubs to man First Time Exhibitor Booths and to hold New Exhibitor Briefings at shows — 1/2 hour before group judging has proven to be a successful time. The average number of shows a new exhibitor enters is three. It is easy to attract exhibitors; hard to keep them in the sport.

Beginning January 2007, the in-ring Judge Observation program will be eliminated. It will be replaced with a Ringside Mentoring Program. prospective judge will be required to complete three separate ringside observations. Mentoring requirements include twelve years as breeder/exhibitor. twelve vears judging experience, or anyone the parent club says is qualified. A list of Parent Club approved mentors is available on the AKC website. the present time, 18 percent of approved judges judge 80 percent of the dogs. The AKC receives 700 judging applications a year, 77 percent are approved for 100 percent of applications.

The Obedience, Rally and Tracking Committee has submitted application in conjunction with the Herding Committee to the Board of Directors to exempt their events from the AKC's Conflict of Interest Policy covering judges. Agility events have already been exempted.

The AKC International Obedience Class has been approved for implementation January 1, 2008. The possibility is being investigated of holding regional competitions with scores being cumulative. Dogs would not need to have a title to compete; the exercises would be a combination of open and utility ones and are ones preformed by 98 percent of international countries. The exercises are posted on the AKC website. The AKC International

Obedience Invitational has not yet been approved, but has been presented to the Board. The AKC has committed to sending a team to Crufts in 2007; it is unlikely a 2008 team will be approved (approx \$35K to send team).

The 2007 Obedience Advisory Committee is considering two immediate changes to the program. The first having Pre-Novice be a titled class and the second is the Obedience Master Program. It is hoped that these programs will help to stop the decline in obedience entries. From 1999-2006 entries have been decreasing 1.4 percent per year. In 2006 entries are down 4.3 percent January through December.

The Obedience Master Program is geared for those in Utility competing for OTCH points, but not placing in the top four and consistently scoring 190 or better. Each Obedience Master Level would require 200 points and after completion of the tenth level, the title of Obedience Grand Master would be awarded. Points may be obtained in either or both Open B or Utility B classes. For example, a dog scoring 190 to 191 1/2 would receive 3 points, dogs scoring 192-194 1/2, 5 points, 195-196 1/2 10 points, 197-199 1/2 15 points, and 200, 20 points The final proposal would be to have regional obedience competitions to include three shows in a row which would be identified and publicized. The top 40 dogs would be invited and the winning four dogs from each regional competition would receive an invitation to the AKC Obedience Invitational along with OTCH titleholders. The first year of the program, circuits would be chosen by the AKC, in successive years clubs would be able to apply for the privilege of holding the qualifying events.

The AKC is strengthening their legislative arm in 2007. A legislative analyst is being added to staff, regional legislative seminars are being scheduled and available materials are being expanded in conjunction with the Public Education Department to educate pet owners and to

increase available sample legislation materials.

Canine Legislative Services now available include: Taking Command (an e-newsletter to which members can subscribe), Legislative Alerts (available on website), Information Packets, Brochures — Make your Contact Count and Disagree Diplomatically, Assistance with Legislative Process, Letterhead Lobbying, Talking Points for Breeding Restriction Legislation, Dangerous Dog Legislation, and Breed Specific Legislation.

Highlights of the President's and Chairman's Reports include:

YTD Revenues-\$45.5 million, Operating Expenses-\$52.0 million, showing a \$6.5 million deficit from operations. With alternative revenues and investments bottom line shows \$3.5 million surplus.

Litter registrations are down 1.3 percent compared to 2005.

Individual dog registrations are down 5.6 percent from last year.

Royalties are up 13 percent.

Recording fees are up 4 percent mainly the result of agility and rally entries.

All 165 breeds were represented at the AKC Eukanuba Invitational. Bred-by Exhibitor entries represented 40 percent of the total 3000 dogs. Sixteen countries were represented and 145 Parent Clubs.

Events are up 12%; entries have topped 3 million. Rally is up 60% from 2005.

Responsible Dog Inserts are being placed in the new Disney releases, Air Buddies, 8 Below, and Shaggy Dog.

Discussion of the New Exhibitor Orientation Program to address dropout rate of novices.

If an event is to be cancelled, an exhibitor can now call the event cancellation number 877-252-3229. Information will also be posted on the AKC website and/or an exhibitor can sign up for email notification.

Details are being finalized on the establishment of an AKC Member

Club Outstanding Sportsman Award. All member clubs will be able to present to the AKC one member they feel should be recognized for sportsmanship.

The Board of Directors will be looking for member input regarding the implementation of a listing of Mixed Breed Dogs. Initially, the thought would be that mixed breeds could be registered with proof of spay or neuter. These dogs would be able to compete in separate Companion Events. Additional information will be forthcoming after the first of the year.

The Ninth Annual AKC Open House will be held at the AKC offices on Madison Avenue, NYC, Sunday, February 11, 2007.

The next Delegates' meeting is the Annual Meeting and will be held March 12 and 13, 2007 in New York City, NY

Seminar Committee: We have a number of seminars booked and scheduled already. Names, dates and topics will be available soon. The only one not tied down is Agility. Please complete the questionnaire so that we will know the appropriate topics, price & etc. Give these forms to Jan Gray, Denise McDonald or Dana Mackonis.

**Agility Classes:** We have just started this session. We are offering an Obstacle Familiarization class and a Short Sequence class. We are looking forward to being able to use the site behind the building for classes.

Fall Show: It is the Saturday of Labor Day. We Love volunteers!! If you have any ideas for trophies, please let Peggy know your trophy ideas or if you want to volunteer. We need a Rally and Obedience Chair, a Safety Person who will make sure all of the cords & etc. are taped down and other people for necessary positions. Ms. Schafer will still be doing Advertising for us. Also let Peggy know about any judges that you want or don't want. Anyone with artistic talent specifically drawing, please contact Peggy!!

**Agility Trials:** The Spring trials are April 20-22 and they open March 5<sup>th.</sup> They are random draw. Our Fall trials will be in late September.

Dec. Obedience/Rally Trials: Our trials went very well. We had more trophy expense as we did these trials in memory and honor of Jane Williams Bergsten. The notes of appreciation from exhibitors & judges will be posted on the bulletin board. Thank you to everyone who helped with the trials. resigning as Chair because of health issues. So if you are interested in becoming the new Chair contact Roger Akers. Most of the committee has agreed to stay on in their positions.

Spring Show: The date is March 23<sup>rd</sup> and we always need volunteers!! We are offering Puppy Groups so bring your puppies out!! Obedience and Rally will be in the Dorton Arena. A sign up sheet is going around for Stewards. We do not know the number of rings and order yet. We really need experienced Table Stewards!!

**Tracking:** Our next test is February 25<sup>th</sup>. It is a TDX test. March 18<sup>th</sup>, we will have 7 TD tracks. Please let Jack Sappenfield know if you are able to help at these tests. **Without your help, these tests cannot be put on!!** 

**Membership:** Congratulations to Laurie Pakel & David Moore, Tiffany Wade and Will & Deb Hanley for becoming new Candidate Members.

**Building Rental:** We are renting the building left & right. We are continuously receiving requests.

**CGC:** March 24<sup>th</sup> will be the next test. Information will be on the web site.

## U.S. Approves New Pfizer Obesity Drug For Dogs

WASHINGTON (Reuters) - U.S. health officials have approved the first obesity drug aimed at treating Americans' increasingly plump pooches, the Food and Drug Administration said on Friday.

The drug, Pfizer Inc'.s Slentrol, helps decrease appetite and fat absorption to help the roughly 5 percent of U.S. dogs that are obese lose weight, the FDA said. Another 20 percent to 30 percent are overweight, it added.

Also known as dirlotapide, the drug can cause various side effects, including vomiting, loose stools, diarrhea and lethargy.

The diminutive Yorkie, which made Raleigh's top 10 for the first time last

year, continues its ascent to the top, moving from 7th to 3rd place.

The "City of Oaks" shows no size preference when it comes to favorite breeds, displaying an equal number of small and large breeds in its local list.

The Miniature Schnauzer, ranked 10th nationally, is ranked 16th in Raleigh.

The Chihuahua's popularity continues to slide locally, going from 4th in 2004 to 10th in 2005 down to 12th this year.
