Architecture for Dogs

For those of you with a little extra time on your hands... I thought these were hilarious!

(Wallpaper*) -- It may be tough to teach old dogs new tricks, but perhaps they can learn to live in new houses. Japanese graphic designer and curator Kenya Hara has made it his mission to find out.

Debuting at Design Miami in early December, in collaboration with a starstudded cast of designers and architects from America, Europe and Japan, this online venture supplies free blueprints for 13 different DIY doghouses, each one earmarked for a particular breed.

Hara hopes that pet enthusiasts everywhere will build them and that

their photos will go viral and kickstart an online architectural discourse about the designs when website launches this month.

Hara has been mulling over the idea of designer doghouses for around 15 years, and the project finally caught the attention

of American investors at Imprint Venture Lab. Hara knew the pet-related theme would be popular, he said, 'I have the impression that the whole world is interested in babies and dogs.'

Building on the "man's best friend" bond, he started by matching designers to dogs, choosing only small breeds that like to live inside. Some are random pairings, such as the Dachshund with architects Atelier Bow-Wow and the Toy Poodle with product designer Konstantin Grcic, but others are special requests, like architect

Toyo Ito who wanted to build for his own Shiba, and Kengo Kuma who was keen to make a new home for a client's Pug.

Because conversation with their canine clients could be a bit one-sided, Hara provided each designer with a dossier of information covering the physical characteristics, temperament and health concerns of their breed. Human needs were considered in the brief, too, which stipulated that the doghouses should be easy for anyone to assemble with ordinary household tools and materials.

Leading the pack, Hara launched the project by designing two doghouses of his own: a hard, paper cone suspended from

the ceiling for a Japanese Terrier and a plywood contraption for a Teacup Poodle. Intended to improve contact between pooch and person, the poodle's structure consists of a 70cm-high, wedge-shaped wooden tunnel enclosing a puppy-sized run of stairs. They lead up to a platform at chair height where the dog can recline while gazing adoringly at his owner.

"Putting a dog on the table is not so good," says Hara. "Yet the floor is a little too far away." Located between these two extremes, Hara's proposal may have conceptual merit. But it took lots of Liver Snaps to coax a live Poodle up the stairs.

This reaction is not much of a surprise since the actual dogs did not participate much during the design phase. And when they did, many were more challenging than human clients. Architect Sou Fujimoto's subject, a Boston Terrier rented at a Tokyo dog park, refused to even go inside the prototype. Scrapping that sphere-shaped model, Fujimoto devised an open-frame structure instead, reminiscent of his House NA.



Most designers started by presenting a conceptual sketch to Hara and his staff who then investigated ways to realize the projects. "Architects are very busy so we tried to provide ideas for materials and construction methods," explains Hara.

Like a fast-paced game of fetch, ideas moved back and forth between the designers and team Hara. Sometimes it took four or five months to develop a realistic solution -- more time than required for many full-fledged buildings. And even then certain proposals, such as Toyo Ito's inflatable, vinyl roof worn on the dog's back, still proved unbuildable.

Others, however, like architect Kazuyo Sejima's home for a Bichon Frise, met with more success. The Pritzker-prize winner had little time to spare, but knew that she wanted to create something fluffy for her assistant's fuzzy white pup. Running with her idea, Hara's group began exploring soft materials and ways to support them.

In due course, all agreed on a curved wooden frame enrobed by a hand-knitted cover. Though it bears little resemblance to the minimalist, glass buildings that have made Sejima famous, her doghouse got a warm reception from its canine resident who crawled inside and took an immediate liking to the soft, protective shell.



The Tokyo architecture firm Torafu also sincerely considered the needs of its Jack Russell Terrier, creating an easy-to-build, simple structure that recycles old clothes. Resembling a hammock, it consists of a wooden frame that supports an old T-shirt, preferably one well worn by the dog's owner. "The smell of the owner is very, very important for a dog," says Hara."

But a pooch's response is only one measure of success. "Architecture for Dogs is not a pet's project," explains Hara. "It is a project for architects." For that reason, he engaged Yugo Nakamura, one of Japan's leading web designers, to create the interactive, trilingual website where participants can download drawings and view instructional videos, as well as upload photos of their newly built pet palaces, showcasing customizations and material substitutions.



"One idea can create lots of architecture around the world," says Hara. And potentially turn Architecture for Dogs into a catalyst for architectural invention.

Cell Tower

The Club has been approached by American Tower, Inc, about placing a cell tower on our property. This company installs and maintains cell towers for AT&T Wireless Communications. The company would like to negotiate a long-term lease with DKC. The term of the lease would consist of an initial 5-year lease with four 5-year renewal leases (25 years). This cell tower lease could generate significant revenue for DKC over the 25-year period.

I have met with their representative to discuss the details of the lease and where the cell tower would be located on the property. The cell tower would require a footprint of 100 ft. by 100 ft. with a gravel access road. Contained within the footprint would be the cell tower, backup diesel generator and a hut containing wireless equipment. This area would be enclosed in a fence (slatted chain link or wooden - our choice).

The board has approved the initial contact and to proceed with the process. Further discussion will be held at our next member meeting on November 19, 2012.



Impervious Surface

There has been much discussion and concern of how much land we have for future development or expansion of our present building. I have some good news. After reviewing the Durham County Unified Development Ordinance, I found a section which describes Exceptions (section 8.7.3) to the new ordinance and I quote:

8.7.3. Exceptions

All development within Watershed Protection Overlays shall be subject to the restrictions in this section, with the following exceptions:

A. Existing Development

For the purposes of this section, existing development shall be considered to include any impervious surfaces constructed before January 1, 1994. All new uses and activities and all expansions of previously-existing uses and activities shall conform to Sec. 4.11.4, Nonresidential Land Use Restrictions and Sec. 8.7.2, General Requirements.

This means that our building, parking area, and road are exempt from the new ordinance. This means that we have over 63,000 sq ft that we can develop. This much square footage should meet all our present and feature needs.

Agility Field Development Update

First, I would like to inform the membership that we have entered into discussion to hold a four-day fall 2013 agility trial with the Danville Kennel Club at the Old Dominion Agricultural Complex in Chatham VA. (http://www.theodac.com). This site is an indoor facility and could be a lucrative endeavor for our club.

In light of this new development and concerns about holding outdoor agility classes, the Board agreed to limit the development of the field behind the building. We would proceed with fencing an area of 120' x 120' for use by our club members, but hold off future development of the fields and review our options after the fall 2013 trial with the Danville Kennel Club.

Changes in AKC Agility Rules

Here is some information regarding new AKC rule changes in agility effective January 1, 2013.

- 1. As of January 2013, the Excellent B classes will be referred to as Master classes and the Excellent A classes will be called Excellent classes. If your dog is trying to earn an AX, AXJ, or the preferred equivalents, he or she must be in the "Excellent" class. Once he or she has earned these titles, she will move into the Master class. Expect to see these class changes on the 2013 entry forms.
- 2. Clubs will be permitted to host up to 12 agility trials a year instead of 8.
- 3. The ability to move *laterally* from Regular to Preferred classes has now been finalized. Here are the basics, from Steve Herwig (AKC rep):
 - Effective January 1, 2013, an exhibitor may show their dog in a Preferred class that is equal to or less than where their dog is currently showing in the equivalent Regular classes. As such, a MACH dog may initially enter Master Preferred level STD/JWW classes, skipping the lower Excellent, Open, and Novice Preferred levels.
 - Once we see a dog qualify in Preferred on/after January
 1, that will become the dog's "starting point" for
 Preferred. As such, if a MACH dog qualifies in Novice
 Preferred on/after January 1, 2013, then the dog must
 complete the Novice, Open, and Excellent level classes
 before being eligible to enter Master Preferred.

- This is a ONE-TIME crossover allowance based on the first qualifying Preferred class entry AKC processes on/ after January 1, 2013.
- No legs/Qs or points cross over from Regular to Preferred.
- Each class (ie, Standard, JWW, FAST, T2B) has its own, separate one-time crossover allowance.
- The crossover does not work "backwards" from Preferred to Regular.

So if a dog is currently in Excellent A Standard and Open JWW, the dog can be moved to Excellent Preferred and Open Preferred after January 1. If the dog gets entered in those levels and does not qualify, it can be moved down (to Open Std or Novice JWW) in the Preferred class. BUT if a dog who has an AX is entered and Qs in Novice Preferred after January 1, it MUST finish the Novice and Open levels before getting back up to Excellent.

If a dog who has the MX and MXJ titles has already been moved down to Preferred and is in one of the lower level classes now, the dog can be entered in Master Preferred classes after January 1, without completing all of the lower level Preferred titles. It's all about what Regular titles the dog has as of January 1 - that determines what level it can be entered in Preferred.

DIY: Felted Dog Ball

Positively fun, absolutely useful DIY. There's something for every skill level, from super-easy felted wool balls and a bagholder that attaches to a leash to a cozy crocheted bed and a folding feeding stand—little comforts that make life more pleasant for both you and your dog. (We'll let you in on a secret: You can also purchase the ball kit, leash bag and bed from the craftswomen who provided the instructions; see the contact information.)

Materials

- Uncarded wool (Merino is the easiest to felt)
- Long piece of roving (washed and carded wool)
- Tights/pantyhose
- · Bowl of hot soapy water

Finished size: Comparable to a tennis ball

Note: For safety, balls intended for use by small children or dogs should be at least the size of a tennis ball and used under supervision.

Beginning

Press the uncarded wool together, shaping it into a ball, and wrap the roving tightly around it. Holding the ball, slip your hand into the tights down to the toe. As you hold the ball inside the tights, use your other hand to pull the tights over your hand, leaving the ball of wool inside.

Middle

Gently soak the ball in the hot soapy water. Leaving the ball inside the tights, toss it from hand to hand; you may also roll it between your hands and squeeze it softly. Do this very gently for about 20 minutes. Next, take the ball out of the tights. Now you can squeeze it much harder; do this for about 10 more minutes. As you work, the ball should get smaller and harder.

End

Rinse the ball in cold water, squeeze out the excess water and let air dry. Read more at http://thebark.com/content/felted-dog-ball#xLZyWgm8KvSqt0x0.99


